Rabbi Roberto D. Graetz will be the special guest speaker at the Rabbi's *Tisch*. He served as rabbi in Buenos Aires, Argentina, and Rio de Janeiro, Brazil for almost 20 years. He acted as Director for Latin America for the World Union for Progressive Judaism, was active in human rights issues during the military dictatorship in Argentina, and worked on behalf of the street children in Rio de Janeiro.



He recently retired from Temple Isaiah in Lafayette, CA. Michael Robinson and Rabbi Graetz met in the late 1960'a when Michael was on the East Coast during a Vietnam war protest, and Roberto was a student at Hebrew Union College. The Rabbi also knows Michael's widow, Ruth Robinson, a Social Action Committee member.

Get Out the Vote with Rabbi George

Saturday, August 27, 2:00 - 5:00 PM



Join Rabbi George and the Social Action Committee as we walk precincts and encourage local community members to vote. The North Bay Organizing Project (NBOP) has launched a Voter Engagement Project to increase voter turnout among groups with historically low voting rates. They have targeted precincts in Roseland and Santa Rosa, mostly populated by low income, Latino, and/ or senior renters. Each of the twenty faith-based and other community groups that are part of NBOP has committed to one day of precinct walking,

between mid-August and the November election. We will not be advocating for particular candidates, but encouraging registered voters to let their voices be heard at the polls. We will also register voters. The CST team will walk on Saturday, August 27, gathering in Roseland at 2:00 PM for a brief training. We will walk in pairs, typically with a bilingual young person who can interpret, if necessary. Rabbi George led CST members in a similar effort two years ago and all found it rewarding. We believe the process of talking with and listening to people who would otherwise be strangers may contribute to tikkun olam, repairing the world. We hope to have at least 15 volunteers from CST. 

Summer in Sonoma County - Keep Your Protection With You

I hope your summer has been sunny, warm and enjoyable so far, with many more such days to come in the weeks ahead. And as various billboards, magazine articles and internet pop-up ads remind us, be sure to keep your hats, visors and sunscreen handy for daily protection. Sonoma County summers last a long while, much to our good fortune.

God's presence in our lives was just like the gift of shade on a burning hot day; this shade was literally and figuratively life-saving protection for all desert-dwelling peoples.

It happens that the Torah also has some advice for us about protection. The weekly parsha (a reading from the Torah) from early July (the time when I am writing this column) was Sh'lach L'cha, from the book of Numbers. In chapter 14, verse 9, it is made clear that in the time of our ancestors' wanderings in the intensely hot desert of Sinai, God's presence in our lives was just like the gift of shade on

a burning hot day; this shade was literally and figuratively life-saving protection for all desert-dwelling peoples.

When the shade (God's presence) is removed from you, you are in big trouble. And when you remove yourself from the shade, you are potentially exposing yourself to the intensity of the sun without the necessary protection. So, the question that comes to us, beyond applying our favorite brands of sunscreen, is "How do we ensure that we keep ourselves spiritually protected, that we remain in God's presence?"

Shomrei Torah has many good answers for that, among them as follows.

- Come to Friday night or Saturday morning services every now and then; and try out a pre-service Torah Study one Saturday.
- Enroll in a class; attend a Tisch; or come to a Sunday morning Bagel Club brunch.
- · Observe the tenth anniversary of Rabbi Michael Robinson's

Weaponry of Prayers

Early Thursday morning, July 7th, I joined many other men and women on a bus to attend a Rosh Chodesh (a morning service) celebrating the new month of Tamuz. Over 400 of us attended the event, organized by Women of the Wall, an organization of Jewish women from Israel and around the world who strive to achieve the right to wear prayer shawls, pray and read from the Torah collectively and out loud at the Western Wall (Kotel) in Jerusalem.

The controversy started when the women in our group were calmly and peacefully going through security - some in the women's line and others in the men's line- to enter the Kotel area. The officers in charge of the security lines seemed to have no problem with this, but the ultraorthodox men were furious! There is no other place in Israel that separates men and women in security lines, and there is no religious reason for the separation. After being called lesbians and non-Jews by the Heredi men, whose entrance to the Kotel was being delayed, we entered the plaza and gathered in the women's section

The service was the most spiritually moving I have experienced in a long time. Women from all denominations and all over

the world huddled around a prayer table as we were led in prayer.

The significance of this moment overwhelmed me as tears began to stream down my face. For the first time, I was at the wall, wrapped in my tallit, praying out loud in a congregation of likeminded people. The women, huddled in a large prayer group close enough that we were touching, behind us our male supporters, who huddled against the separation barrier between the women's section and the plaza, joining us in prayer. During Hallel (the petitionary section of the morning service) the men's voices could be clearly heard antiphonally answering our prayers. I looked back and was amazed by the sea of men who care so deeply that women should also have the right to wear t'fillin and talitot, read from the Torah, and pray out loud at the Kotel. These are inspirational men!

As the communal voice of our prayers deepened, so did those of the opposition. Men on the other side of the *mechitzah* (divider in orthodox prayer spaces separating men and women) stood on plastic chairs to look over at the women's side and scream at us. The orthodox men proclaimed proudly that they were bigots: calling us dogs and whores, telling us to go to Tel Aviv to pray in our bathing suits while Rabbi David Ingber, a supporter, retorted by screaming "Justice! Equality!"

While the unkind men were distracting, their actions were not among the most heartbreaking. In front of

our group of women deep in prayer were orthodox women facing the wall, wearing capes unkind words written on them for us to read. They were blowing whistles, banging on chairs and screaming at us. Many tried to break into our huddle and disrupt our prayer, trying to take away our Torah and prayer books, and screaming very hurtful words. Hearing the women scream

at us was so much more disturbing than anything the men said. They truly believe that because of our gender, some religious rituals are off limits.

And, to make matters worse. one of the orthodox women took a prayer book and passed it over to the men in the men's section, where one of them tore up every page in the book. As he completely desecrated the name of God. he threw all of the shreds of paper back onto the women's section. This blatant disrespect for the sacred words, prayer space or other humans could not have been carried through without the complicity of the women.

As the sights and sounds of the beating, clapping, whistles and shouting swarmed around us, our prayers rose and grew and carried even more loudly and strongly. My tears were tears of thankfulness, disbelief and determination. I pray that all of our daughters will be able to wear tfillin and a tallit, while reading from the Torah at the Kotel in years to come. I pray that our children will be able to pray together, side by side, in an egalitarian minyan at the Kotel.

May our prayers be prayers of peace and not used as tools for war.






