6 sessions: Feb. 1, 8, 15, 22; Mar. 1, 8, 2017 7:00-8:30pm







## A Dance with the Divine

When standing for the *Amidah*, the most central prayer in our service, I am transformed from the present to an ancient time I can only imagine. I stand before the ark, our holiest scrolls dressed in royal garb seated on the throne of honor. I am small— a mere mortal— in an exquisite marble castle, alone before the Divine. The openness of my heart and its intentions are essential; my words and choreography deepen the experience and meaning.

Many people, confused by prayer and ritual, spend much of their prayer time worrying about what others are doing and thinking, perplexed about when to sit, stand, bow, lift our heals, cover our eyes. I can't count the number of people who have told me they are confused and worried about how to pray "correctly." As long as your heart is open, you are praying correctly!! That being said, many movements can accompany and enhance our prayers.

In monarchies, pomp and circumstance create distance between common people and royalty. The ritual of following behind and bowing to the king or queen creates inward feelings of respect. In much the same way, during brief moments of deep prayer, outward signs of respect are mirrored inwardly and seep into all streams of consciousness. Completely alone in a room full of others, I stand before the ultimate sovereign.

As the Amidah begins, we sing "Adonai s'fatai tiftach...Adonai open up my lips so my mouth may declare Your praise." It is with this psalm that we begin the central prayer of our service asking for ability to praise God sufficiently. At this moment we take three steps back leaving the natural world and immediately take three steps forward entering into direct communication with the Divine. It is traditional to begin the steps with the right foot, the "normal one" to show eagerness when approaching the Divine (Strassfeld 293). During the opening line, I am verbally and physically asking to be ready to communicate with God.

Immediately following this opening psalm, we continue with the *Avot v'Imahot* section of the *Amidah*, linking ourselves with our biblical ancestors. It is on the first word "Baruch" that I bend my knees, followed by "Atah," when I bend at the waist, straightening back to up to standing by "Adonai." This movement— a quick bow followed by being upright by the time we recite a name of God—is another sign of respect

as we symbolically enter the presence of the Divine. The bow is to be from the waist "with upper body and head (but not as far as the belt, for that would connote the arrogance of a prideful piety)." (Landes 61) It is important to be back to standing upright by the time we recite *Adonai's* name because it is written, "*Adonai* raises up those who are bowed down."

This same bowing structure is used at the beginning and end of the first section of the *Amidah*, thus connecting us to our biblical ancestors.

I can't count the number of people who have told me they are confused and worried about how to pray "correctly."

As with any other ritual, there are particular times to perform the act and times when we are not supposed to perform it. During the second section of the *Amidah*, the *G'vurot* section where we praise God for God's power and strength, especially in nature, we do not bow even though the Hebrew "Baruch atah Adonai" is the same as the times before when we did bow.

During the next section, the *Kedushah*, we raise our heals off of the ground each time we proclaim God's holiness, thus bringing us symbolically closer to the Divine. Rabbi Landes explains, "The congregation says

the *K'dushah* while standing with feet together and eyes heavenward."(Landes 91)

It is during this section on God's holiness that the majestic nature rings through the music and the musical dance occurs. The *Kedushah* is not supposed to be sung fully by a Bal T'filla (prayer leader) or fully together with the congregation. This prayer and all of the music that was subsequently written for it is like a very specific dance. There is a back and forth, a particular call and response, a precise way to praise God and God's holiness. Technically (Gra, Ma'aseh Rav 44), the proper way to repeat the K'dushah is as follows:

- 1. *N'kadesh* ("Let us sanctify..."):
  The prayer leader alone recites this introductory section through *v'kara zeh el zeh v'amar* ("They called out to one another.")
- 2. The congregation responds with Kadosh Kadosh Kadosh ("Holy, holy, holy") to m'lokhol ha'arets k'vodo. ("...full of glory")
- 3. The prayer leader and the congregation then alternate, with the congregation concluding the end of each section that the prayer leader savs. . .
- As vkara zeh, bow to the left; at el zeh, bow to the right. We rise on our toes at each mention of kedosh.
   Some people do so once also at Barukh k'vod and again at Yimlokh (Ben Ish Chai, Trumah 4-6) (Landes 91).

This back and forth nature and when to rise to your toes has been made easier to understand with the new formatting in our Mishkan T'filla prayer book. Even though I know that true prayer can happen anywhere, at any time, in any position, in any language, as long as our intentions are pure, I appreciate the Dance with the Divine. The Dance, in its repetition and discipline, grounds me and brings the world into focus. The symbolic meanings behind the movements remind me of my smallness and put my thoughts and desires into perspective. The grace and flow of the Dance and the majestic tone of the music transport me into a spiritual realm where thoughts and prayers can ascend.
