AIDS Quilts Memorial Display June 12-14

It began last May when Rabbi George led a group of congregants on a trip to the "Jewish South," and will conclude the weekend of June 12-14 with a salute to the Names Project AIDS Memorial Quilt showing on display in Shomrei Torah's Sanctuary.

Several congregation members were touched by personal loss, and so moved by the presentation at the site in Atlanta where the quilts are housed, they began the conversation to bring the display to Santa Rosa.

The result will be the centerpiece of Shomrei Torah's Salute to Pride Month on June 12-14. The display from 10 am to 6 pm on Sunday, June 14 will include 72

articles, most recently "Cultural Resources Management" in the International Encyclopedia of Social Sciences.

Dr.Praetzellis has worked on archaeological sites across the UK and USA. He is Professor of Anthropology at Sonoma State University and acts as faculty advisor to Sonoma Hillel. He is also a longtime CST member and member of the Lifelong Learning Committee.

How did Jews adapt to life in medieval England and 19th century California? Archaeology reveals the hidden details, challenges the idea of a single "authentic" Jewish practice, and suggests a way forward.

Dr. Adrian Praetzellis has a number of areas of specialization within Archaeology including: Historical, California, and Urban Archaeology, Cultural Resources Management, Archaeological Field Methods, Local History, and Research Methods. He

Rabbi Michael Robinson Memorial Tisch Stanford Professor, Clayborne Carson Selma 50 Years Later – American Jewish Community & the Civil Rights Movement August 14–6:15 PM


Shomrei Torah's former Rabbi, Michael Robinson, was a man devoted to human rights and social action. On the 9th anniversary of his passing, the special guest speaker at the annual event honoring him will be a Stanford professor whose life has been devoted to the workings of Martin Luther King, Jr.

Dr. Clayborne Carson will speak on: "Selma 50 Years Later – The American Jewish Community and the Civil Rights Movement." Rabbi Michael was arrested and put in jail with King on a march in St. Augustine Fla. During the 1950's, Rabbi Michael was often on the same podium with King during the civil rights marches.

In 1985, King's widow, Coretta Scott King, selected Clayborne to edit and publish the papers of her husband. Dr. Carson has devoted most of his professional life to the study of MLK Jr. Under his direction, the King Papers Project has produced seven volumes of a definitive edition of King's speeches, sermons, correspondence, publications and unpublished writings.

Dr. Carson's work reflects not only his research about King but about his own activism. His latest book: "Martin's Dream: My Journey and the Legacy of Martin Luther King, Jr." traces his life from teenage participant in the 1963 March on Washington to international King scholar.

Carson is also editor of the "Eyes on the Prize" TV series on the civil rights movement. He also edited a companion volume of readings widely used in college level American history classes.



Update on Congregant Richard Lazovick's Search for a Kidney

(At Kol Nidre Services last year, Rabbi George announced that Richard needed a kidney. Several people called to express support. Only a few have been tested. UCSF will not reveal information about potential donors without their permission. An ideal donor is blood type "O". However, if someone is not "O" but is otherwise qualified, they can be entered into a system as a cross match, i.e., they can donate to someone who is a donor that can donate to Richard. Dear Friends,

My kidneys are continuing a slow decline. My prescriptions are slowly getting stronger. We are slowly adding new meds, and I now have to limit my fluids. If I am lucky, this shall slowly continue until I get a new kidney. It is possible that more drastic failure can happen at any time, and I will have to take more serious actions, such as switching to HemoDialysis, which happened to a friend.

Although my health continues to decline, my mental health is much better. I've started to accept my situation and move on. I am continuing to work on growing my business, www.iTechTutor.com, making technology easy for others to understand. I help with all technology from TV's and stereos to smart phones, tablets and computers. I teach classes at the SRJC and the Finley Center as well as Oakmont for the Mac and iPad user groups. I also do private lessons as well as computer repair.

On a more personal note, my son, Joshua, had his Bar Mitzvah, first in his class. A big success. He took Nordquist dance and has been doing great in school and is on the honor roll. He is going on a trip with his Spanish class to Costa Rica. His mother is taking him. I wish I could go but am not ready for that kind of travel. We will be going to my parent's family reunion in SoCal this summer.

I do dialysis at home with a tube connected to me at night. I have to set aside two days a month for delivery because I do not know until after 4 pm on Friday when my two-hour delivery window will be the following week.

I want to take this opportunity to thank Congregation Shomrei Torah, Rabbi George, the Jewish Community Center of Sonoma County, and the Jewish Family & Children's Services for the support they have given me.

My greatest wish will be to let everyone know when I find a donor for a new kidney.

Walk to End Genocide

April 26th was a Chai Day; 180 people registered to walk the 7th Santa Rosa Walk to End Genocide. The walk was one of five nationwide walks that raise awareness and funds for Jewish World Watch (JWW.) Much of JWW's work and programs are centered on improving the lives of Sudanese and Congolese survivors of genocide and atrocities. The 2-mile walk started and ended at CST. Pre-walk activities included poster making and painting a shade cloth for the Little Ripples preschool in Chad. The Little Ripples preschool is a JWW program located within a refugee camp for refugees from Darfur. The Santa Rosa walk raised over \$10,000 for JWW. JWW has an excellent website for more information and also to donate online: www.jww.org.

Prior to the walk, speeches helped inform and inspire walkers. The speakers included: Rachael Cutcher, CST Board President; Christyne Davidian, Co-Founder of Armenians of the North Bay; Julie Combs, Santa Rosa City Councilwoman; Rabbi Kramer; Jake Matalon--long distance from Israel—and Noah Bacon. Julie Combs read a proclamation from the City of Santa Rosa proclaiming the day, Genocide Awareness Day. A Genocide Awareness proclamation from the County of Sonoma was also displayed.

1 in every 28 children in the U.S. have a parent in jail or prison (300,000 of those children live in the Bay Area). Project AVARY, located in San Rafael and founded in 1999, offers guidance and training to children of prisoners. These youth are more likely to live in poverty, to have attachment and post-traumatic stress disorders, to underperform in school, and to experience feelings of abandonment and shame.

Project AVARY is more than a program; it's a community that gives kids a sense of dignity and hope. With our care and support, children develop essential life skills in leadership, environmental awareness, emotional intelligence, communication, conflict resolution and independent living.

For families who need a Jewish gestational surrogate, the wait can often be as long as 5 years. A gestational surrogate is a woman who carries the pregnancy of another family but who has no genetic connection to the child. And for each family matched with a Jewish Egg Donor, we have another 50 families still waiting.

We are certain that there are many loving and kindhearted Jewish women who would draw great joy and satisfaction from offering this life altering gift to those who are in desperate need of it.
