
"Politics from the Pulpit," an issue that is very much in the news today. Our visits with Rabbi George are annual highlights of the Men's Bagel Club.



Refugee Ban

In response to President Trump's executive order on January 30 that severely restricts immigration from seven Muslim countries, suspends all refugee admission for 120 days and bars all Syrian refugees indefinitely, the majority of rabbis from Sonoma County issued a joint statement below to express support to the Muslim community and protest the attack on freedom of religion and our Muslim neighbors. This letter was distributed to the Press Democrat and emailed to members of the congregations represented by the rabbis.

Joint Statement of Sonoma County Jewish Clergy on the Recent Refugee Ban

In synagogues around the world this week, Jews are reading of the Biblical process leading to the exodus from slavery in ancient Egypt. We are reading of the people's longing for freedom, and of Moses' advocacy for his people to be able to worship freely. As the story unfolds, our ancestors become refugees,

of promise. How poignant is the call to us to remember that we were strangers in the land of Egypt! How many times in the course of the intervening millennia have the Jewish people been refugees?!

America is a nation of refugees and immigrants. The fabric of our democracy is woven with the colors and textures of the millions and millions of people who have brought genius, vitality, creativity and productivity to our land.

war, displacement, and loss of family members. Such a decree on International Holocaust Remembrance Day is an affront to human sensibilities.

As Americans and Jews, the undersigned Jewish clergy of Sonoma County call upon our community to publicly express our outrage at this course of events. While the security and safety of Americans is a priority, it is clear that the extensive vetting process of refugees,

immigrants, and permanent residents has been thorough and deep. Most refugees wait at least two years to come to this country, others even more.

The implicit banning of Muslims from certain countries is a dizzying call for reaction. The assumption that all Muslims are terrorists is outrageous.

When Jewish refugees were banned from this country at the height of the Holocaust, there was little outcry. At this time we cannot sit on the sidelines as similar events unfold. Now

is the time to do for Muslim refugees what we wish had been done for Jews fleeing Hitler: to truly be a Mother of Exiles.

CST Action Items

I was originally going to title this month's message "On Civility" and discuss at length the long-standing Jewish traditions regarding discussion and debate on important communal matters: they are always to be conducted "for the sake of Heaven," to produce the greatest good for the greatest number.

Minority views were never meant to be lost forever in the actions of a majority. Rather, our Sages told us that regarding differences of opinion, "both these words and those words are the words of the living God."

Truly, when we enter discussions as open-mindedly as possible and listen and speak through the filters of trust and respect for one another, we have the best chance to strengthen our sense of safety and well being together in community.

Now, though, instead of continuing in that vein, I want to switch focus to some current, specific topics presently in front of the Board.

Each month the full fourteen members of the congregation's Board of Directors meets for two to three hours to discuss business matters. (See the list of board members at the back of this newsletter.)

The Board's agenda is often influenced by what the sixmember Executive Committee, which also meets monthly, worked on in their meeting a

week earlier. The issues range from small to large. What follows are some examples of ongoing important areas where there are questions now under review and where decisions need to be made regarding future actions.

First, how do we best express gratitude to those among us who continually give of themselves, whether financially or by volunteering or both, for the betterment of all? Do we list their names in a roll of honor? Call them forward at special services? Host them to exclusive lunches? Here at CST, our most usual answer seems to be so fitting: that we donate even more in time and money to honor the prior donations of time and money!

Second, how do we engage our traditions of civility and inclusiveness to find goodhearted and kind ways in which to seek to activate the oftendormant volunteering natures of some of our members? We all benefit each time any one of us steps forward to lead or pitch in on some project.

Related to that, how can we respectfully and lovingly call to the attention of our lowest-contributing (in terms of dollars) members the basic facts of our financial lives here – that our expenses run at about \$2,700 per member unit per year? And that small, monthly increased pledge amounts, and careful consideration of our "fair share" formula can all add up to a more financially secure CST for all?

Third, although the Board has already recently voted to implement some form of streamlined annual membership renewal process, starting with the next fiscal year (we run from July 1st through June 30th for membership and fiscal purposes), how do we best safely, honorably, openly and administratively let everyone know that "once a member, always a member," unless you inform us otherwise?

We know from the examples of other synagogues that have already adopted "automatic renewals" that they can run smoothly, be widely accepted and save much office labor each summer leading up to the fall high holiday seating process

and religious school enrollment. Now, though, how do we legally and safely implement that change here at CST without seeming presumptuous, rude, arrogant, ruthless or callous?

Instead of going into more specifics, I will sum them up for now by saying that we face the same congregational issues that are present elsewhere. There must be *flow* for our CST ecosystem to remain healthy - money, time, talent and other resources; members old and new; honor and respect – all need to be continually infused into us for our best overall health and vitality!

Let me close by sharing with you a wonderful honor that I have just received: I have had the opportunity to speak with our three newest about-to-be members, who have each just submitted their applications to us.

One is a young interfaith newlywed couple, who, having attended our services, have chosen to join our community over others accessible to them, as they consider raising a family. Another is a retired individual who has also seen and liked us. And the third is a recently relocated professional couple that seems to be about as sophisticated and talented as the best of the rest of us. Talk about healthy flow - wow! Are we ever fortunate for what we are and who we have!

Board Update

At its regular meeting on January 12th, the CST Board reported on the following:

- The Board adopted new motions set forth by the Finance Committee and Buckingham Financial Service, detailing how we will use our Endowment and Mortgage Funds.
- The Board discussed the future possibility of Live Streaming our services and other events to our members who are unable to make it to CST for such proceedings.
- The Gelt-a-Thon raised over \$27,000! Thank you to everyone who donated time and/or resources!
- CST celebrated a large adult B'nei Mitzvah class, which was very rewarding and fulfilling.
- The Board discussed the Directory fundraiser and how well it is coming together.
- The Purim Schoiel will feature music and skits from "The Lion King."
- Planning for the 10-year Anniversary is coming together nicely.
- A group of volunteers is taking over the Shomrei Gift Shop.
- Paige Sobel is in charge of Volunteer Coordination.

LED conversion enters Phase II at CST

In Phase I of the LED conversion, 141 incandescent and halogen lights were switched to LED comparable style bulbs by a group of volunteers and funded by the Men's Bagel Club. The next phase involves switching the 43 high wattage and high-use metal halide bulbs in the parking lot and around the outside of the building to LED. The volunteers have wisely decided that this exceeds their skills and climbing ability. Bids are being solicited for the job, and Rick Reisman has applied for a Travel Justly grant from the URJ to help defray some of the cost. The project also qualifies for a PG&E rebate for the LED light bulbs. Hopefully, the payback time on this investment will be short from the energy savings inherent in LED light sources.

Tied to the LED project led by the Environmental Action Committee are plans to help spread the LED benefits to Shomrei Torah members with a raffle for LED fixtures and bulbs, as well as "at-cost" sales to members that will be part of the gala 10 year anniversary celebrations for CST planned in June.

<u>Step 3</u>: Organize disaster supplies in convenient locations.




<u>Step 4</u>: Minimize financial hardship by organizing important documents, strengthening your property and considering insurance.




