

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


#### Sukkot Party Sunday, October 16, 2:00-5:00 PM

#### PRESIDENT'S **MESSAGE**

#### We Are Having A *B'nai Mitzvah* - And You Are Invited!

At the beginning of the summer my wife and children and I attended a bar mitzvah for the grandson of one of my cousins back in New Jersey. It took a lot of planning, and departing at summer's start was hectic; we wound up devoting an entire week to traveling, attending and enjoying this wonderful family event. Before it was over, I cried with both joy and pathos for the beauty of the passing of the Torah scroll from generation to generation; for the entire history of the Jewish people; for the more recent history of my family; and for thinking of some of the trials and tribulations, joys and successes that had already come into the life of this particular boy whose bar mitzvah it was that day. Once returned home, I was very glad that we had gone there, despite the significant effort it took.

Then, just a couple of weeks ago, right here at home, I decided to go to Saturday morning services here at Shomrei Torah. I got here just at 10:30 AM and was surprised that the cars in the parking lot were already almost down to the entrance. I realized that I must have stumbled onto a *bar* or *bat mitzvah* right here in Santa Rosa, at my own congregation, although not intentionally. I got over

my first blush of discomfort for not being dressed more formally and decided that since I was already here, I should certainly go into the sanctuary; that I could slip into a back row; so I parked and entered.

I was completely drawn in by the ceremony that I was now witnessing and taking part in along with the rest of the congregation who were present, joining the child's family and friends in celebration of their b'nai mitzvah.

The back row idea didn't work out; all the seats were taken except for a few way up in the front, up close, so that's where I wound up sitting. After just a few moments, I forgot all about my Sonoma County informal garb as I was completely drawn in by the ceremony that I was now witnessing and taking part in along with the rest of the congregation who were present, joining the child's family and friends in celebration of their *b'nai mitzvah*.

Just as I had been enthralled a month earlier for a similar family event, I was once again completely captivated by being present with this other family, one I had never even met, as their child stood at the end of a line on the *bimah*, and the scroll was passed down from generation to generation, to carry forward the Jewish tradition of honoring the *Torah's mitzvot*.

Along with everyone else present, I laughed and I cried as the service went on, speeches were made, gifts presented; and especially when the child's mother and father each spoke of their heartfelt love and pride in the moment. It was truly beautiful; it was just one perfect explanation (among many others) for why we have all come together in Santa Rosa to form Shomrei Torah: to carry forward our traditions.

The Baal Shem Tov, the founder of the Hassidic movement, took a long time to pray over Shabbat. He would begin Shabbat morning services with his followers, a couple hours later; they would be done, yet he would still be engrossed in prayer. They would sit in quiet reverence and wait; twenty minutes, a half hour, even an hour until he was done. Together they would make *Kiddush* and eat a nice Shabbas meal.

You have to understand that the *Baal Shem Tov* (which means, Master of a Good Name), was no ordinary person. Some say he could be in two places at one time! Others noted that a short ride in his carriage could land you temporarily in another

One day, after his followers had finished praying and they were waiting for the *Bsht* to finish, the aromas of the *Kiddush* lunch were especially enticing. One man said to another, "You know, we could quietly leave this room, enjoy a little herring, maybe some schnapps, come back and he would not even know we were gone." Another replied, "How can you say such a thing, we could never leave our master before he is done *davening*." "We really won't be leaving," another said. "We'll be just next door. We'll be back soon enough." The *Bsht's* followers argued amongst themselves for a little while when one Hassid quietly left his seat and began to ease out toward the *Oneg* table. ### *L'Taken* Through the Lens of One Participant\*

In a word, the *L'Taken* social justice seminar was a singularly unique experience for me. I was, admittedly, more excited at first to be traveling across the country for the first time in my life than to be taught about Jewish values and politics. And though we were given time to explore Washington D.C., and I greatly enjoyed that time, it doesn't stand out as the highlight of the trip for me when I look backwards.

I came to find the lecturing portion of program actually to be quite fun. There was not a single activity which failed to keep me engaged after its introductory period, and Jewish lessons as well as political ones were ingrained in those activities in ways that prompted further discussions rather than simple acceptance. Because it is taught in a manner which guides those in attendance through their own thought processes, the program facilitates young interest in politics and Judaic reasoning alike through each attendee's own unique lens.

Capitol hill was truly larger than life, and being in Washington was an experience which I will not forget, but to my own surprise, the things I learned at *L'Taken* were the most powerful portion of my experience.

#### A Call to Take Care of Our Veterans\*

One of the roles of religion is to comfort the disturbed and disturb the comfortable.

This winter Shomrei Torah held a forum on Veteran affairs and I picked up this bracelet from Team AmVets of California. It says, "22 Everyday" and it refers to the number of vets that commit suicide every day; almost 1 an hour...

I wear it to remind me that I/we have an obligation to care for our vets, an obligation that we have yet to even recognize, let alone fulfill. I also wear the bracelet because our Vets are mostly invisible to us.



We send them far away, pay little attention to what we ask them to do and almost completely ignore them when they return. This bracelet reminds me of that shame and my responsibility to do something about it.

To comfort the disturbed and disturb the comfortable...

For too long the faith based community has been silent about what is happening to our vets.

We, in the progressive religious community, are quick to protest military action but unresponsive to the needs of our vets when they return from war.

"To disturb the comfortable" means to "speak truth to power," to make the invisible seen, to stand with the vulnerable, the neglected, the abused and demand action.

Where is that voice? I urge you to bring veterans and their various needs into your spiritual homes and ask yourselves and your leadership, what does our faith call us to do, what can we do, what ought we do?

To comfort the disturbed and disturb the comfortable... That's our calling. Now let's get to work.
